BIBLE BACKGROUND

NATURAL DISASTERS and your CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP

THE Caribbean region has had a long history of being affected by **natural disasters**. These are catastrophic events caused by natural processes of the Earth. These events usually result in widespread loss of human life, major structural damage, severe economic disruption and significant environmental damage.

It would seem that natural disasters are not God's judgment upon an individual or a nation. They are part of the essential foundation of the creation that has fallen because of human's sin. *"For the creation was subjected to frustration, not by its own choice ... We know that the whole creation has been groaning as in the pains of childbirth right up to the present time"* (Romans 8:21-22).

BIBLE PROPHECIES

Bible prophecies indicate that natural disasters will increase in frequency and intensity as the end of the age

approaches (Matthew 24:7; Luke 21:25-26; Revelation 6:12; 11:13; 16:18). These events seem to coincide with some of the events being predicted by scientists because of the phenomenon of global warming. Global warming is the gradual increase in the overall temperature of the earth's atmosphere generally attributed to the greenhouse effect. And, what is the greenhouse effect? It is a term used to describe the phenomenon whereby the Earth's atmosphere traps the sun's warmth, which would otherwise escape into space.

BIBLE BACKGROUND

NATURAL DISASTERS and your CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP

GLOBAL WARMING

This effect is caused by the presence of significant amounts of certain gases, such as carbon dioxide (CO₂), methane (CH₄) and nitrous oxide (N₂O).

The Earth has warmed by an average of 0.85°C since 1880. This increasing trend of global warming is unequivocal and unprecedented over decades to millennia. This information was generated by the **Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC)** which falls under the auspices of the United Nations. The IPCC (2013) and climatologists are **predicting an average global temperature increase of 3.2 to 7.2 degrees Fahrenheit by 2100**. This increase in global surface temperatures has been projected to cause severe droughts and more intense storms.

ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP

The practical response of the Christian to help reduce the sources and impacts of climate change should be environmental stewardship. Climate change refers to significantly observed or measured long-term changes in average weather conditions.

Two measures in which environmental stewardship can be achieved are through adaptation and mitigation.

Climate change adaptation is an initiative to reduce the vulnerability of natural and human systems against actual or expected global warming and changing climate conditions. Mitigation is human intervention to reduce the amount of greenhouse gasses emitted into the atmosphere.

Sound climate change adaptation and mitigation practices include expanding rainwater harvesting, the use of better water storage and conservation techniques and the improvement of land management. Examples of the latter environmental stewardship practice are erosion control and soil protection through tree planting, the enhancement of building codes to ensure hurricane proof buildings and reducing the dependence on fossil fuel as the main source of energy.

REDUCE CARBON FOOTPRINT

Individually, we can also reduce our own **carbon footprint**. We can do this by reducing, reusing and recycling wastes, turning off electrical equipment when not in use, using energy efficient light bulbs, and using water more efficiently. We can also use less paper or go paperless when conducting certain activities.

Trust Sovereign God



BIBLE FOCUS

Psalm 135:6; 147:15-18; Job 38:1-18; Genesis 8:20-22;
Romans 8:19-22

KEY VERSE

The LORD does whatever pleases him, in the heavens and on the earth, in the seas and all their depths. — Psalm 135:6 NIV

BIBLE TRUTH

Whatever our circumstance or crisis, God is always in control.

LIFE QUESTION

How does my behaviour reflect good stewardship of my faith in our Sovereign God in times of natural disasters?

THAT'S LIFE

Sandra was a Christian but she was perplexed by the recent weather patterns. She found herself asking, "Where is God when we need Him?" Her country had experienced no substantial level of rain this year. This was only a fraction more than the level of rainfall her territory received last year. So far, this year's hurricane season had brought no rain.

The hillsides were brown from the drought. The farmers were complaining bitterly that their crops were dying. They did not know what they would do if it did not rain soon. To make matters worse, due to poor maintenance, the pumps at the reservoirs were breaking down

and this triggered wide spread water lock-offs. Due to the economic crisis facing the country, there was no money to replace the pumps.

The country might even have to turn away cruise ships that were scheduled for later this week, to meet the local demands for water. The water company had disclosed that it had to be choosing between supplying the cruise ships with water or providing citizens with the scarce commodity. Sandra muttered, "Lord, is it the people's lewd lifestyle why we are experiencing this severe drought?"

What advice would you give to Sandra? What is your usual reaction to drought or other types of adversities?

WHAT DOES THE BIBLE TEACH?

Seasonal features of life in the Caribbean include drought, storms, hurricanes and waterspouts. Earthquakes and volcanoes also occur in our region. Such calamities affect our life in many different and adverse ways.

How does God expect us to respond to natural catastrophes? This month's Unit, including today's Lesson, will help in giving us a God-centred perspective on and response to natural disasters.

1. God Is Sovereign – Psalm 147:15-18; Job 38:1-18

In Psalm 147:15–18 we learn that nature is not an impersonal mechanism that just does what it wants. It is not out of control. It is governed by God. Although meteorologists can forecast the weather and provide explanations or conjectures for its immediate cause, the Psalm being studied reinforces that God is Supreme and the natural environment, including weather patterns, cannot do anything without His permission: *“He sends his word and melts them; he stirs up his breezes, and the waters flow”* (v. 18). Sometimes God allows certain changes in the weather to remind human beings that He is in control and to give them the opportunity to repent. The created order, including the weather, glorifies God. Similarly, we should honour God with our life, faith, speech and actions; even when faced with natural disasters.

Reading from Job 38:1-18, we are introduced to God's response to Job. Having defended himself against accusations from his friends that the hardship he was experiencing was the result of sin; Job sought God's help in understanding the cause(s) of his severe illness and trials. Through a series of rhetorical questions, God warned Job that everything is subjected to His Will and ought to bring glory to Him.

God reminded Job that He, God, was the One who laid the foundations of the Earth and marked off its dimensions (vv. 4-6). He fixed the limitations on the sea to determine the extent of its reach (vv. 8,16). Everything that happens, therefore, is as a result of God's decree or at God's permission. Even the clouds and the stars are subject to the dictates of Almighty God (vv. 7, 9-11). In the midst of natural calamities, we can rest assured that God is still in control.

God remains true to His promises, He will never abandon us, His children, in natural or man-made crises.



“Sovereign God, remind me that You are always in control. I pray that I will exercise faith in You and exude Your peace that passes all understanding, when I face natural disasters. Amen.”

2. God Exercises Mercy – Genesis 8: 20 - 22

The Great Flood (Genesis 6–8), the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah (Genesis 19), and the plagues on Egypt (Exodus 7-12), are all key examples that God has in the past used natural disasters to carry out His judgement. Note, however, that in all those extraordinary instances, the righteous were spared. Furthermore, through special revelations, warnings of impending events were given. Exemplary judgement on a nation is always preceded by a prominent warning and call to action of some kind.

The natural disasters of our time, including storms, hurricanes, earthquakes, tsunamis, volcanoes, tornadoes and drought; do not follow the pattern of God's exemplary judgement. Therefore, the belief that any and every calamity which comes upon the earth, is an act of God's judgement, is false. In natural disasters, both Christians and non-Christians die. God in His exemplary judgement will not condemn the righteous with the wicked.

Our merciful God has promised that He would never again use flood or natural disasters to punish the wicked, as He did not want to destroy all living creatures (Genesis 8:20-22), in carrying out that judgement. This is one indication that God will not punish the wicked by wiping out His creation and the righteous people.

The sinner is deserving of eternal death (Romans 6:23). God is angry against all sin and ultimately everyone will suffer His judgement and eternal punishment, if they do not repent (Luke 13:1-5). Hell or the Lake of Fire, not natural disasters, will be the punishment for those who disobey God (Revelation 20:15, 20).

3. God Knows Earth is Groaning – Romans 8:19-22

The passage signals that God created the Earth with the intention that perfect harmony would exist between humans and the plants, animals, weather systems and all creation. However, because of the presence of sin in the world, the Earth will sometimes behave erratically, triggering catastrophes; as it groans like a woman experiencing labour pains (vv. 21-22; Matthew 24:7,8). Humankind's acts of pollution have also damaged the Earth in numerous ways. The Earth is expectantly waiting on a time when Jesus will return and remove sin's presence forever. Christians also live in hope of such a time.

Romans 8:20–22 alludes to another purpose for the natural calamities, which come upon the world. They occur to frustrate humankind in the hope that we will seek God's liberation from our spiritual bondage (v. 21). Our encounters with these natural adversities should urge us to be in a right relationship with God.

Reality Check

How do you respond when you face natural disasters? Give God the priority in your life, whether or not you encounter natural disasters.

Stay Alert and Hopeful



BIBLE FOCUS

Mark 4:35-41; Ecclesiastics 9:1-3, 10-12; Hebrews 2:14-18

KEY VERSE

They were terrified and asked each other, "Who is this? Even the wind and the waves obey him!"

— Mark 4:41 NIV

BIBLE TRUTH

Disasters occur as we engage in normal everyday activities but God enables us to take precautionary measures and to cope with those adversities.

LIFE QUESTION

In the midst of any disaster, do I remain a responsible steward of God and an example of God's wisdom, hope and peace?

THAT'S LIFE

Just when everyone thought the drought would last forever, a hurricane had hit the island. The weather forecasters had only been able to give the citizens' a day's notice. "The hurricane season has taken a turn for the worse," Brother Mark complained, as he swept mud and water out of his house. Last night Brother Mark's yard was so flooded that some of the water had flowed under the door, into the house.

In addition, a tree had fallen and damaged the roof at the back of Brother Mark's house, causing leaks and water damage to his furniture. This was the

second time in two years he was facing problems with his roof due to a hurricane. Last year, the winds from Hurricane Matthew tore off Brother Mark's roof and he had to re-roof his dwelling. Now, he had no money to fix the problem.

His son's school tuition was past due. He had a grace period of 5 days and he was on day 4. To make matters worse, his manager at work had called him into his office two days ago, to advise him that the company was filing for bankruptcy. The company would be closing down.

In what ways can you identify with Brother Mark? How would you encourage Brother Mark?

WHAT DOES THE BIBLE TEACH?

The Lesson reminds us and reinforces that no matter what circumstance we face we can be models of peace, hope and faith if we trust God completely. Our witness can be Christ-centred. Therefore, in times of disaster, we can, be hopeful as we rest on God's promise, that He is faithful and will strengthen and protect us (2 Thessalonians 3:3; Isaiah 41:10).

1. Spiritual Preparation for Disaster – Ecclesiastes 9:1-3, 10-12

The writer of the book of Ecclesiastes is identified as “*the Teacher*” (1:1-2). Based on the description of the writer, theologians conclude that “*the Teacher*” was either King Solomon or someone close to him who wrote on his behalf. The third king of Israel, Solomon was and is regarded as the wisest person who ever lived (1:16; 1 Kings 4:30).

In chapter 9, the writer further elaborates on his comments in chapter 8; positing that the future is unpredictable and no one knows the hour of his or her death. At the beginning of chapter 9, he reminds us that we all share a common destiny, whether righteous or wicked, good or bad, clean or unclean, those who perform religious rituals and those who do not (v. 2). He notes that evil is prevalent, but death is certain for those who are good and those who are evil (v. 3).

“*The Teacher*” further reminds us that we may receive divine favour or disfavour—we have no control over which we receive or when we receive it. Both the wicked and the righteous are subjected to the same calamities. Further, no one even by righteous deeds can gain control over God and coerce blessing from Him (v. 2). The writer acknowledges that God is Supreme. Therefore, we who trust the Lord should remain hopeful, whether or not we face natural crises, or adversities, which are caused by humankind.

Given that no one can determine the time of his or her death, (v.12), we should constantly strive to be prepared. Spiritual preparation for death is the most important thing in life. Since God holds the future and the keys of death, then we should seek to be in a right relationship with Him. Such a preparation is the first and best precautionary measure for everyday living and for disasters.

2. Reliance on Our Storm “Remedy” – Mark 4:35-41

Jesus our Lord, also faced natural disasters. The passage recounts that a violent storm threatened to destroy the boat in which Jesus and His disciples were travelling. A furious squall developed but, Jesus remained asleep on a cushion in the back of

the boat (v. 38). Distressed, the disciples awakened Him, asking if He did not care what happened to them. Jesus' first response was to quiet the storm. Then, He turned to the disciples and asked them why they were afraid (v. 40).

Does the question posed by the disciples sound familiar to you? Do you sometimes wonder whether or not Jesus cares about what you are going through in the midst of your storms? Why do you sometimes become fearful? Jesus calls us to trust Him in all the adversities of life. While we cannot be sure of what life will bring, we know that both good and bad will come. It, therefore, is our responsibility to be alert, always watchful and ready. Complete trust in God demonstrates that we believe that He is omnipotent— all-powerful— and that He acts in our best interest.

3. Confidence that God Is Hope and Salvation – Hebrews 2:14-18

In Hebrews, the writer of the book, challenges us to *pay the most careful attention* to the messages that we have heard about Christ Jesus, so that we do not ignore the salvation that Christ provides for each of us (2:1-3). Jesus became flesh and blood in order that He might share in our physical nature; so that by His death, He might destroy the devil's control over death (v.14). In so doing, Jesus destroyed the power of physical and eternal spiritual death over His people. Having committed your life to God, there is no reason to fear death—whether death comes as a result of a disaster or other causes. God gives eternal life to those who have invited Him to be Lord of their life and who trust in Him (v.15). Jesus suffered persecution. He, therefore, not only knows but also understands our adversities and is ready to help us when we face trials (v.18). Jesus prepared for the trials He was to face. Similarly, we should exercise godly wisdom in planning for disasters and be targetted in preparing in advance, how to protect the resources with which God has blessed us.

God is our hope in times of despair and joy. Hence, we have every reason to trust God completely; to allow His hope to reign in our hearts and to rejoice in His salvation.

Reality Check

Make a list of actions you should take to show that you are a responsible child of God and faithful steward who takes disaster preparedness seriously. Commit to doing these actions.

Think of a promise from the Scripture that helps to reassure you in times of trouble. Write it down and read it silently. Reflect on why that promise speaks to you. Then, share it with your classmates. Pray that God will help you to hold fast to that promise and keep it in your heart.

Respond with Reverence



BIBLE FOCUS

Romans 11:33-34; Joel 1:1-20; Job 8:1-7; 42:10;
Habakkuk 1:12-13

KEY VERSE

Oh, the depth of the riches both of the wisdom and knowledge of God! How unsearchable His judgments and unfathomable His ways! For who has known the mind of the Lord, or who became His counsellor?

– Romans 11:33-34 NIV

BIBLE TRUTH

Our God Who has given us life and all we possess, should never to be viewed through the lens of what seems fair by human standards.

LIFE QUESTION

In times of natural or human disaster, what is my perspective on God and what attributes are reflected in my speech and behaviour?

THAT'S LIFE

Cherry, a member of a Christian family, grew up in a rural district. She gave her life to the Lord at an early age. A young Christian, her life was marked by humility and service to God. On completion of high school, she was unable to matriculate to tertiary institution, so she obtained an entry-level job to allow her to attend evening classes in order to repeat some subjects.

Despite her setback, Cherry's spirituality never waned. Combining work and school proved really difficult. Her parents provided what support they could, within their means, but things were not going as anticipated. She remained hopeful that God would provide a way for her to achieve her dreams.

A breakthrough came when Cherry was selected to work overseas in the Hospitality programme. This brought joy to the family. After completing her first year, Cherry's contract was renewed and her employer indicated an intention to "file for her".

One evening while Cherry was in a grocery store, a lone gunman entered and started shooting wildly. When security personnel responded, Cherry was among ten people who were killed. Christine's family was devastated. They couldn't believe that after she was finally seeing her way, God allowed her to be killed. It was difficult to make sense of this. They knew that restoring their faith in God would be very hard.

What steps could be taken to help the family cope with this spiritually difficult situation?

WHAT DOES THE BIBLE TEACH?

Whether or not we are encountering a crisis, we should always respond to God with reverential awe. Giving God the deep respect and worship due to Him at all times will allow us to grow in holy character and love of God. Disasters should be viewed as tools for enhancing our spiritual growth, not for retarding it.

1. Turn to Prayer and Fasting – Joel 1:1-20

Locusts, which are grasshopper-like insects, formed enormous swarms that spread across the southern Israelite kingdom of Judah. These voracious pests consumed the vegetation, resulting in massive loss of food crops (vv. 7,10). Olive trees, wheat and barley, pomegranate, palm and apple trees, and all other fruit trees were lost. The cattle and sheep were also suffering from an absence of grass in their pastures and this had caused death of some animals (v. 18). The situation was further complicated by drought, which was also affecting the land (v. 12b, 20). The combined effect of the drought and locusts resulted in the plants becoming dry, withered and unfit for human consumption.

The drought-stricken and locust-infested plants had also become a source of bush fires: *fire has devoured the pastures in the wilderness and flames have burned up all the trees of the field* (v. 19). The bush fires created even more losses for the farmers; lack of food and drink for the livestock and wild animals; and more hardships for all the people in general (vv. 19-20). The impact of the locust pests' invasion and drought included: food shortage, famine, neglect and ruin of the food storage facilities, including the granaries.

Prophet Joel warned the people that unless they confessed their sins, repented and reestablished their relationship with God, the catastrophe would not come to an end, (vv. 13-14). Joel proclaimed that the natural disaster was God's judgement on them because their persistently sinful ways had angered God. The prophet appealed to the priests to announce and lead a time of fasting, prayer and public repentance.

In times of adversity, we also need to repent and appeal for God's mercy irrespective of our relationship with God, disasters should prompt us to respond with reverence to God. While, within our era, God does not usually use disasters to punish persons living in disobedience to Him; disasters should prompt all groups of our society to pray and seek God's forgiveness, mercy and direction. In every calamity, which affects us personally or collectively as a community and nation, we need to enquire of God what lessons He is trying to teach us through the disaster.

2. Build Christian Character – Job 8:1-7; 42:10

Robbery and fire from heaven resulted in Job losing all his animals. In each incident, most of his servants also perished, with only one from each area remaining to convey the news. Job's children were also killed in a freak accident in which the wind blew in from the desert and struck the four pillars of the house causing the house to cave in on them. Finally, Job himself was afflicted with painful sores from the top of his head to the soles of his feet (Job 1-2). Bildad was one of three friends who visited Job with the intention of comforting him after they had heard about the tragedies that he was encountering. In chapter 8, Bildad counselled Job, that God was just and fair in His actions. He accused Job and his children of having turned away from God.

Bildad implied that if Job would repent, God would forgive him and deal with him kindly (vv. 5-7). Job's friends angered God by assuming that Job's trials were because Job had sinned (Job 42:7-8). Throughout his trials, Job revealed his genuine character, which included his faithfulness to God. Job was obedient to God, revered God and shunned evil (1:8). During his trials he learnt to be unwavering and to trust God more; no matter what the situation or problem. Job never worried or doubted God in his suffering (13:15). Although Job could not understand the reason for his tribulations, he trusted God. As a result of Job's steadfast commitment to God in his trials, he reaped abundant blessings. God doubled Job's wealth after his trials and also gave him other children and long life (42:10-13).

3. Trust God and His Wisdom – Habakkuk 1:12-13

The prophet, Habakkuk questioned God's *fairness* in raising up and empowering a wicked nation, the Babylonians, to punish the Israelites. He lamented the injustices and the violence that were taking place. He was sad that while he had been crying out to God for help, it seemed that God would not listen (Habakkuk 1:2-4). Habakkuk recognised that God is pure and holy and thus could not endure seeing evil for long. And while God does not tolerate wrong, yet He, God, was using a more wicked nation to punish the Israelites who while not perfect, were more righteous (Habakkuk 1:6-7, 12-13). Whatever circumstance we find ourself in, we should realise that God will use whom or what He wills to accomplish His purpose. God never makes a mistake!

Reality Check

How could someone show reverence to God in the midst of bewildering circumstances such as the loss of a child or a devastating illness? How would you? Name two ways in which you can better reflect God's purpose for your life during a disaster. Pray for humility to recognise and accept your dependence on God to sustain and deliver you.

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
